Subject: LOCAR Public Comments

Dear Dr. Ehlinger:

We the undersigned organizations appreciate the opportunity to submit these comments on the Final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the North of Lake Okeechobee Reservoir Section 203 Study. There is widespread agreement that more storage upstream of Lake Okeechobee is needed to meet water quality and water level management goals for the Lake and downstream systems, and this project will significantly help achieve these goals. Indeed, the Lake Okeechobee Component A Reservoir (LOCAR) is the largest Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan storage feature north of the Lake, representing a major advancement toward meeting the 200,000-acre-foot storage goals for the area.

To that end, we support the preferred Alternative 4 in the EIS, which has the smallest footprint and avoids sensitive areas. While no single project can meet all upstream storage needs for Lake Okeechobee, LOCAR will complement other projects in the region including the Lake Okeechobee Watershed Restoration Project, Kissimmee River Restoration, and several ongoing state efforts. This reservoir is also near the Brighton Valley water quality feature which offers the opportunity of linking the two projects for synergistic benefits to the watershed.

Commendably, the South Florida Water Management District and Army Corps worked in record time to create a robust proposal, ready for authorization under the Water Resources and Development Act of 2024. When complete, this project will increase storage and treatment capacity north of the Lake – a need underscored by high Lake levels and recent releases to the coastal estuaries.

We support this project moving forward and appreciate consideration of these comments.
